## NAMPOL HONOURS 17 FALLEN OFFICERS

The Namibian Police Force has honoured 17 police officers who died in the line of duty during the inaugural International Day of Remembrance for Fallen Officers on 07 March 2026 at Israel Patrick Iyambo Police College in Olympia, Windhoek. The 7<sup>th</sup> March will be observed each year by all INTERPOL member countries as the International Day of Remembrance for Fallen Officers. The commemoration was held under the theme **'Fallen heroes in blue forever remembered'** and is meant to honour police officers who died in line of duty.

The memorial ceremony was attended by police officers, families of the fallen officers and members of the public. Seventeen candles were lit, doves were released as a symbol of peace, a moment of silence was observed and the eternal flame was lit, followed by the laying of wreaths in memory of the following fallen officers:

Speaking during the remembrance parade, Hon. Lucia lipumbu the minister of Home Affairs, Immigration, Safety and Security (MHAISS) described the fallen officers as heroes who sacrificed their lives while protecting communities.

"To the bereaved families present here today, your profound loss resonates deeply with all of us. The void left behind by your loved ones is still measurable, yet it is met by the nations in joy, in gratitude and in solidarity. We grieve alongside you, acknowledging that your sacrifice extends beyond the immediate tragedy." However, Hon. lipumbu held that in order to minimize future losses and better protect officers

who serve communities daily, there is a need to improve working conditions, strengthen training programs for police officers, and enhance their psychological well-being.

Speaking at the same event, Lieutenant General Joseph Shikongo indicated that the 7<sup>th</sup> March which is recognized internationally, reminds us that policing is not just a profession but a calling, one that demands courage, sacrifice, discipline and an unwavering commitment to the safety and security of the people and that of our nation. "This separate occasion calls upon us to pause, to reflect, and to honour the brave men and women who paid the ultimate price in service to our public."

The officers in Kavango East also paid tribute to the fallen colleagues at the Kavango East Police Regional Headquarters and was attended by police officers from various stations and specialized units within the region. The gathering served as a moment of reflection and respect for the brave men and women who dedicated their lives to protecting the safety and security of the nation. Officers present paid tribute to their fallen colleagues, acknowledging the courage, commitment and sacrifice they made while serving the public.

and in moments of danger and difficulty. The ceremony observed moment of silence in honor of the fallen heroes whose service and sacrifice will never be forgotten.

## NAMPOL JOIN HANDS WITH STAKEHOLDERS FOR SAFER INTERNET AWARENESS

Safer Internet Day is commemorated worldwide, annually on 10 February. This year, Namibia joins the international community in raising awareness about online safety and responsible digital citizenship.

Spearheaded by the Ministry of Information and Communications Technology (MICT) in collaboration with Ministry of Gender Equality, Poverty Eradication and Social Welfare (MGEPEWS), UNICEF, Salt Essential IT and ChildLine/LifeLine Namibia; the Namibian Police Force joined the outreach programs across constituencies in Kavango West Region from 09-13 February 2026 to promote the safe and responsible use of the internet.

The outreach campaign is aimed to advocate for responsible online behavior and mindful posting on social media platforms. The awareness sessions focused on key issues such as cyberbullying, cybercrime, online child sexual exploitation and abuse (OCSEA), and how to identify warning signs and formed part of preparations for the commemoration of World Radio Day and Safer Internet Day, which was held at Mururani in Mankumpi Constituency on Saturday 14 February 2026 under the theme **"Smart tech, safe choices: Exploring the safe and responsible use of AI."**

Community members have welcomed the initiative, describing it as timely and informative. A resident of Kaguni village in the Kapako Constituency, applauded the government for extending the campaign to rural communities when the team visited their village on Wednesday, 11 February 2026. She shared her recent experience of losing money through an organized scam that targeted her FNB account via her mobile phone.

"This information is really important, and we are grateful that it was brought to us because there are a lot of people scamming others through the internet," she said.

In addressing residents at Kaguni village, police officers from NamPol's Cybercrime Sub-Division educated the community on how to avoid falling victim to online scams. The officers urged the public to safeguard their personal information, use strong and unique passwords for each account, enable two-factor authentication, review privacy settings regularly, and verify online content before sharing and report cybercrime to the relevant authorities.

As incidents of online abuse continue to rise globally, community members emphasized the importance of such outreach programs, particularly for learners and the elderly who are vulnerable to cyberbullying, exploitation, harassment and other forms of online abuse. Learners were sensitized on the dangers of sharing personal information, images and videos online, and are informed about available reporting mechanisms such as Lifeline/ChildLine toll-free numbers 116 and 106 where they can report online abuse and related crimes as well as seek assistance and counselling.





# NAMPOL'S CADET CONSTABLES TO GRADUATE AT TWO TRAINING CENTERS IN 2026

Preparations are underway for the graduation of the Namibian Police Force's 2025/2026 Cadet Constables, with two ceremonies scheduled to take place this year.

The announcement was made by the Inspector General of the Namibian Police Force, Lieutenant General Joseph Shimweelao Shikongo, during his visit to the Pius Joseph Kaundu Police Training Centre (PJKPTC) in the Omaheke Region on Friday, 13 February 2026. Addressing six hundred and seventy (670) students, the Inspector General encouraged them as they prepare to commence their Work Integrated Learning Programme on 09 March 2026.

According to the Inspector General, this year's graduation will be held at two different venues to accommodate the large number of Cadet Constables, currently undergoing training. The

decision follows logistical challenges associated with accommodating more than 2,000 graduates and guests at a single venue.

One ceremony will take place in the Omaheke Region for students at PJKPTC, while the second ceremony will be hosted in the Oshana Region for students from the Ruben Danger Ashipala Police Training Centre (RDAPTC) and the Simon Mutumba Mutumba Police Training Centre (SMMPTC).

Currently, RDAPTC has a student population of more than 1,200, while SMMPTC has 285 students. For the Oshana ceremony, students from SMMPTC will join their counterparts at RDAPTC in Oshakati, bringing the total number of graduates for that event to nearly 1,500.

The Inspector General also reminded the students

that the Work Integrated Learning Programme, which will take place at A-Class police stations across the regions, is designed to equip them with practical experience before they officially join the ranks-and-files of the Namibian Police Force. He further encouraged them to remain disciplined, uphold integrity, and work hard as they begin their policing careers.

"Today is a day to prepare to become a leader, to become a commander. Do not get a rank that comes from favour; get a rank that comes from hard work," he urged.

The Inspector General also reminded the students that they should be ready to serve wherever they are deployed, as policing requires dedication and commitment to the nation above personal preference.







# NAMPOL AND RECON AFRICA BRING HOPE TO A VULNERABLE FAMILY IN KAISOSI

In a heartfelt gesture of compassion and community service, on 03 March 2026, the Kavango East Police Regional Commander and his management team handed over a newly constructed home structure to a vulnerable woman in Kaisosi location. The roof structure was generously donated by RECON Africa, who also contributed to bedding, kitchen utensils and food supplies to support a 50-year-old single mother of five children.

Her situation was identified through a community assessment conducted by the Police Wellness Office; the Office also responsible to improving the welfare of vulnerable members within the community and as such, in collaboration with RECON Africa as part of their social responsibility and community upliftment, efforts were made to assist the family. The new roof was constructed by the Work and Estate Unit from the Namibian Police Force on 16 February 2026.

Speaking during the handover ceremony, Senior Inspector Hamutenya narrated how her

situation reached the Office of Wellness. During recent heavy rains, the old structure of her house collapsed, leaving the family traumatized and exposed to harsh weather conditions. Recognizing the urgency of the matter, the Office of Wellness quickly mobilized support to ensure the family would have a safe and secure shelter.

A representative from RECON Africa, Mr Kasera, also expressed appreciation for the partnership with NAMPOL to assist the woman. He stated that the company is dedicated to identifying needy individuals within the community and assisting wherever possible. He confirmed that RECON Africa will continue to play its part in uplifting vulnerable families as part of its corporate social responsibility initiatives.

A thankful woman filled with tears of joy, expressed sincere thanks to NAMPOL and RECON Africa for their life-changing support. "I did not know that I would be able to sleep under a proper roof again," she said. She shared that she is an orphan, having lost her parents many years ago, and has

struggled to raise her children with very limited support. According to her, the only assistance she receives comes from a cousin. She thanked God for guiding the donors to think beyond their own needs and prayed for continued blessings upon them. She further expressed heartfelt appreciation to the Regional Commander and his management for reaching out to her and her children during their time of need.

A family member, emphasized that the new roof has removed a heavy burden from the family, noting how painful it was to witness their family member daily struggles yet could do nothing. The handover stands as a powerful reminder that through unity, compassion, and shared responsibility, meaningful change can be achieved in the lives of those who need it most.

The Namibian Police Act 19 of 1990 was drafted for a different era. Today's challenges are digital, transnational, and networked. Yet the law that governs policing has barely changed. Section 13 of the Act lists NamPol's core duties, and these remain essential.

Namibia's security landscape has changed dramatically since 1990. Cybercrime, trafficking, and financial fraud are now routine concerns. In early 2025 alone, over one million cyber threats were recorded against Namibian systems. The country ranks 110th in the National Cyber Security Index, illustrating how exposed it is to digital crime. Yet the Police Act still reflects a time before the internet became central to everyday life and criminal activity.

Modern policing is increasingly intelligence-driven. It depends on data analysis, early warning systems, and cooperation across agencies and borders. NamPol has already begun moving in this direction, most notably with the launch of the Criminal Intelligence Analytical Unit in 2025.

However, effective intelligence-led policing requires a strong legislative foundation. Laws must clearly provide for the lawful collection, sharing, and analysis of information, while also safeguarding the rights and freedoms guaranteed by the Constitution. Without modern legal provisions, investigators may face limitations when dealing with crimes that unfold online, across jurisdictions, or through complex financial networks.

The Police Act has served Namibia for more than three decades, but the threats it was written to address have changed beyond recognition. Updating Section 13 to include detection would bring the law in line with modern practice and give NamPol the authority it needs to act decisively and lawfully in the 21st century.

Updating the Police Act would not replace the fundamental principles of policing in Namibia. Rather, it would strengthen them by ensuring that the Namibian Police Force is equipped with the legal tools necessary to respond effectively to

contemporary threats.

The amendment is a small textual change with major practical consequences. It strengthens NamPol's operational base, clarifies accountability, and signals that Namibia is serious about building a forward-looking, intelligence-driven police service. Detection is not an extra; it is the missing piece that can make policing smarter, fairer, and more effective.

As crime evolves, so too must the legal frameworks designed to combat it. Ensuring that Namibia's policing legislation keeps pace with technological and global developments is therefore not only a matter of institutional efficiency, but also an essential step in safeguarding national security and public confidence in law enforcement.

# NAMPOL WOMEN'S NETWORK CELEBRATES 16 YEARS OF EMPOWERING WOMEN IN POLICING

The Namibian Police Force (NamPol) marked the 16th anniversary of the NamPol Women's Network on 26 February 2026 at the Israel Patrick Iyambo Police College in Windhoek. The event brought together senior officers, junior officers, and invited guests under the theme, "Honouring the Past, Empowering the Future of Women in Policing."

The celebration was a special moment to reflect on the progress women have made within the Force and to recognize their growing contribution to policing in Namibia. It also highlighted NamPol's continued commitment to gender equality and the development of women leaders.

In her keynote address, Khomas Police Regional Commander and Chairperson of the NamPol Women's Network, Commissioner Johanna Ndahafa Ngondo, spoke about the vision behind the creation of the Network. She said the Women's Network was officially launched on 26 February 2010 to create a space where women in policing could support one another, grow in their careers, and play a stronger role in shaping the institution.

Over the past sixteen years, the Network has grown into an important support system for women in the Force. It has helped promote mentorship, leadership development, wellness

programs, and community engagement. More importantly, it has given many officers strength and encouragement, while helping to turn the goal of gender equality into something practical and visible.

The Network continued to grow from its original purpose into a strong platform that helps women take up leadership roles and make a meaningful contribution to the work of the Force, moreover grew in assessing situations of communities and supporting and assisting the needy, especially women and children.

The event also highlighted the progress made so far in the police, with women now making up 41 percent of the total strength of the Namibian Police Force, while 37 percent of decision-making positions are held by women. These figures show clear progress in improving the representation of women in leadership and management.

The celebration also recognized the important role women play in modern policing. Across the country, female officers continue to serve with professionalism, courage, and resilience in areas such as crime prevention, investigations, traffic control, community policing, and peacekeeping missions. Their contribution has not only strengthened the organization internally, but has

also helped build public confidence in the police service.

Women were encouraged to keep supporting one another and to be ready to step into leadership when opportunities arise and be an inspiration to many young women across Namibia, who aspire to joining law enforcement.

Looking to the future, the NamPol Women's Network plans to strengthen its mentorship efforts, support policy and research engagement, and help prepare the next generation of female recruits. The Network also aims to embrace innovation and technology as part of its role in supporting modern policing and professional growth.
